**Wolff von Roos** is a young and active organ recitalist and has performed in venues across the United States and Canada. Wolff has studied with renowned organists such as Raul Prieto Ramirez, who is currently San Diego Civic Organist and former professor of organ at Ball State University, and at the organ academy of McGill University of Montreal, QC, with teachers such as Professor Hans Ola-Ericsson and Katelyn Emerson. Wolff currently has his Bachelors degree in the science of music as well as organ performance under the direction of Dr. Stephen Price of Ball State University in Muncie, IN. Wolff is most known for his use of improvisation, which he learned by studying the music of modern French improvisers such as Pierre Cochereau, Jean Guillou, Thierry Eschaich, Olivier Latry, and others. He most notably uses that skill often to accompany black & white silent horror movie films like Nosferatu, Phantom of the Opera, etc, as well as service playing. Wolff currently holds the title of Artist in Residence & Associate Organist of Broadway United Methodist Church in Indianapolis, IN. Wolff has also been a featured performer on the radio music program Pipedreams, based in St. Paul, MN, and produced and distributed by American Public Radio, where the music of pipe organs can be heard all across the United States. By day you can find him on the organ bench, but by night you will most likely find Wolff playing jazz guitar with his trio, "Von Roos & The Wolffpack".
